## Dear Homeowners and Businesses:

Ensuring maintenance standards of the levees in Reclamation District 1608 is of the utmost importance. As stated in our previous newsletter, preventive action is needed to keep our levees safe. On the reverse side of this newsletter, we review some of the more common issues our District Superintendent encounters during his regular inspections of the levees. Do review "Joe's Maintenance Minders." Keeping the levees clear of obstacles is especially important during the upcoming winter months.

The flood insurance map became final in October, 2009. The Reclamation District is not presently in a flood hazard zone. Flood insurance is therefore not required but is recommended by the Board of Trustees.

The District has repaired several gates and installed one new gate on the levee.

At a recent Board meeting, a presentation was made on the Interstate 5 North Stockton Corridor Project—an 11.5 mile project, extending from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. to two miles north of Eight Mile Road. Twenty-two bridges and five water crossings are involved. ## Joe's Maintenance Minders

Our District Superintendent, Joe Bryson, must conduct inspections frequently to ensure that the integrity of the levees is maintained. You can help. Here's how:

- An RD 1608 sign states "Do Not Remove the Rocks." Removing the rocks on the levees is a violation of the California Penal Code. If you observe anyone removing stones, throwing rocks in the water or disturbing the rip-rap, call the Hotline (209) 406-9142. The rocks are there for flood protection purposes.
- Do not use the levee or area near the levee for storage or dumping.
- Do not cast off building materials onto the levee.
- Remember: No grass or other vegetation on top of the levee.
- Wild animals on the levee? Call the Hotline.
- Please keep the fence lines trimmed. Joe must be able to look into backyards without obstruction 10 feet from the levee toe.
- Please do not lock gates on your property along the levee crown that would prevent inspection or access during an emergency.
- Make sure any irrigation pipes (or other pipes) on the levees are not pressurized except when being used. Also, inspect your pipes frequently for leaks. The control valve turnoff must be at least 10 feet away from the toe of the levee on the land side.
